## **School Budget** 2.7% Under Cap

At the Public Hearing on March 19th and thirteen municipal and civic meetings, Superintendent Craig Henry presented the 2008-2009 school budget. "To be respectful of peoples personal economics and gain consumer confidence in the quality of education Southern is known for, we have come in 2.7% under cap," stated Craig Henry.

The State of New Jersey allows school districts to increase their budget by 4% each year. Southern has scrutinized various aspects of the budget in order to remain under the allowable growth ceiling. In three of the seven district municipalities, the average assessed homeowner will experience tax relief. The average homeowner in Barnegat Light will see a decrease of \$141.45, in Ship Bottom \$27.14 and Surf City \$24.44. After seeing tax adjustments in previous years the remaining municipalities will bear only minor changes averaging \$19.95 in Stafford, \$0.23 in Long Beach Twp., \$108.54 in Beach Haven and \$16.07 in Harvey Cedars. "This budget includes no new programs," stated Henry. In addition to administrative costs going down, Southern has "gone green," and is cutting costs by conserving energy and expanding the continued on page three

### 2008-2009 Southern Regional School District Budget

### RESOLVED, that there should be raised for the General Funds \$37,110,642 for the ensuing school year.

The statement above is what you will see in the voting booth or on the sample ballot during the upcoming school election on April 15th. What does this statement mean?

The "General Fund" is the main operating fund for the district. Day to day expenses and operations are funded and tracked in this fundeverything from salaries, benefits, textbooks, electricity and fuel for the busses. The question that is posed to the voters in the voting booth asks for approval of the tax levy needed to fund the General Fund - or in other words – the day to day operations of the school district. There are two other funds that are also part of a school district budget: the Special Revenue Fund, for the tracking of federal and state grant dollars, and the Debt Service Fund, for the payment of debt from previously approved bond referendums.

Due to a change in law, the 'budget cap' that school districts have had imposed has been eliminated and replaced with a 'tax levy cap.' School districts, unless they qualify for a waiver, cannot increase property taxes more than 4% than the year before. For this year's budget, Southern was able to hold the property tax increase to only 1.3%. This year's budget is considered a "preservation budget;" in other words, the district will be able to preserve what it had in the previous year's budget, with some modest restoration of some of the many items cut

from last year's budget. This new budget will accommodate reinstatement of a teaching position at the Middle School, several assistant coaching positions and the purchase of equipment for the school's television studio that will meet the goals of the recently developed District Strategic Plan. Savings from the school's energy management program as well as a reduction in other areas, particularly administrative costs, are helping Southern to limit the property tax increase.

Southern Regional School District continues to provide a comprehensive and diverse academic program that results in 84% of Southern graduates attending college. Southern's High School Proficiency Assessment scores are above state average and in the top three in Ocean County. Southern has also implemented an In-District Autism Program that will provide a superior educational setting and opportunities for autistic children at a considerable savings to the district. Southern also continues to provide an adult diploma program - one of only two left in the Ocean County. Southern's extracurricular and athletic programs serve thousands of students.

### How is the rate and municipal share of each constituent district determined?

This is the result of a rather complicated state formula which annually allocates shares of the regional district for tax purposes. It should be noted that the STATE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION and NOT the Southern Regional School District calculates the regional apportionment formula. The regional apportionment formula takes two factors into consideration: equalized real estate valuations and the total elementary and high school enrollment in each community. Small changes in enrollment may cause dramatic shifts in the tax burden. The "Percent Share by Town" chart shows how the municipal share has fluctuated over the past five budget years.

### How does Southern Regional fund its budget?


The "Revenue" chart below shows where Southern gets the funding to support the budget. The district continues to receive little State aid in support of the budget.

district-wide recycling program.

Through the retooling of existing programs the following will be included in the 2008-2009 budget all while remaining 2.7% under the State imposed budget cap.

- Through necessary technology upgrades, SNN, the district broadcast channel will change from analog to digital allowing for more up-to-date daily information and a higher quality programming.
- One additional Middle School mathematics teacher will provide supplemental instruction and assist students with the "*No Child Left Behind*" federally mandated benchmarks.
- Reinstatement of four to six assistant coaches, from the over 20 that were cut last year. This will provide after-school opportunities for more than 200 students who are currently not participating in extracurricular school activities.
